BACKGROUND AND SCOPE

Since its conception in the 1950's Regional Science, an interdisciplinary field of scholarly endeavor has seen many changes. The enhancement of knowledge and technologies and the growing of Globalization endowed several techniques of regional science and location theory less applicable.

Dr. Jan K. Brueckner

Chancellor's Professor Department of Economics University of California, Irvin

Professor Jan K. Brueckner received his Ph.D. degree from the Stanford University, 1976. He is an economist who specializes in urban economics, public economics, industrial organization and housing finance. He has been the Fellow of Regional Science Association International since 2005 and won the Walter Isard Award for Scholarly Achievement and the John M. Quigley Medal for Advancing Real Estate and Urban Economics. He also actively participates in international academy communities and is currently the members of editorial boards of numerous leading journals including Economics of Transportation, Journal of Air Transport Management, Journal of Housing Economics, Journal of Real Estate Finance and Economics, Journal of Real Estate Research, Journal of Urban Economics, Real Estate Economics, and Regional Science and Urban Economics. He was the editor of Journal of Urban Economics in 1991-2007

Dr. Jinn-Yuh Hsu

Distinguished Professor Department of Geography National Taiwan University

Professor Jinn-Yuh Hsu received his Ph.D. degree from the University of California at Berkeley. He is an economic geographer who specializes in high-technology industries and regional development in late-industrializing countries. He won the Ta-You Wu Memorial Award and the Outstanding Research Award, which are two major academy awards in Taiwan. He also actively participates in international academy communities and is currently the members of editorial boards of numerous leading journals including Area Development and Policy, Dialogues in Human Geography, Eurasian Geography and Economics, Geoforum, Geopolitics under Globalization, Political Geography, and Regional Studies, Regional Science.

Many landmark buildings are located in this area: the Taipei Financial Center (Taipei 101), Taipei City Hall, Taipei City Council, National Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Memorial Hall, World Trade Center, Taipei International Conference Center, International Commercial Building, Grand Hyatt Taipei, etc. With the greatest number of landmark buildings, Xinyi Dist. is considered the political, economic, and cultural center of Taipei City.

Ximending has been called the "Harajuku of Taipei" and the "Shibuya of Taipei". Ximending is the source of Taiwan's fashion, subculture, and Japanese culture. Ximending is also the main LGBT district of Taiwan, with a host of many clubs and pubs surrounding the area. This area is in the northeastern part of Wanhua District in Taipei and it is also the most important consumer district in the Western District of Taipei.

When the export of tea became important in northern Taiwan in the mid-19th century, many businessmen came to Dadaocheng. The first store was Linyishun in 1851. Two years later, many people moved from Bangka following a serious fight. In the early 20th century, Dadaocheng was one of the most populous cities in Taiwan. In 1920, it became part of the newly incorporated Taipei City.The district is known for the local Taiwanese cuisine, the Chien-Cheng Circle.

Established as the third national park in Taiwan in 1985 under the national park law, YMS NP is one of the few NPs in the world that is located nearby to a metropolitan city. They may not look like volcanoes now, but the over twenty or so peaks that make up the national park are all naturally parts of volcanic cones or offshoots of them. Don't worry, the volcanoes are dormant (the last eruption was 300,000 years ago.)
